Guest Artists



The Alpaca Social Club hit the festival with fresh sounds from exotic lands with a taste of Arabic, Celtic, funk soul and gypsy jazz cultures.

The two musicians at its core are piano/accordionist Craig Denham and bassouki/guitarist John Sanders. They gained notoriety in the NZ music scene through touring in diverse locations – from festivals like WOMAD to Stewart Island.

Fans describe their live show as "a pyrotechnic display of dazzling virtuosity" and "a quantum leaping musical curiosity", playing with skill, humour, passion and adventure. The Club's debut album was released in 2017 and sold out on the first tour, so work has begun on a follow up tome. Through a creative fusion of their instruments, they create sonic landscapes that belie the size of the band!

Workshop – Strings plus Things – Creating Soundscapes

Building a soundscape on strings and arranging accompaniment. If you've heard my sound... it's

not just plain ol' guitar. It has integrated bass lines, chord chops and stomp pedal.

I'd like to open up a few festival goers to the potential of their instruments even if they're not strings to create uniqueness, which helps sell



an act and make it stand out from the rest...

What does that mean? I've spent the last 22 years creating a unique sound on strings by adding a second pick-up under the bass string on guitar and bouzouki and interesting bass lines in with chords. I also add a simo pedal to get the kick drum sound and work that together with the bass lines. In between I use chords to colour the sound.

What I like about this idea is that it can transcend instrument type. It's about broadening the mind, thinking outside the box but living in it. This isn't everyday stuff. But I'm willing to share some trix!!

Workshop – my approaches to composition, arrangement, performance & the creative process.

I've spent my life composing and performing music across a broad range of styles. From different world music's to jazz, blues, folk, soundtracks for stories, live theatre or sacred dance. Music with a whole range of functions beyond just entertainment. I have a deep love for the power of music and the good it can do in the world.

This workshop is intended to be a Q&A session with musical examples exploring something of my

creative process and how I think about composition and arrangement as well as performing.

Come find out about the 3 levels of music and what the unseen worlds has got to do with it!



American West

Every so often a musical act appears that seems to exist on a continuum rather than any particular moment of time.

American West is a roots group following the well-worn path taken by Ry Cooder, Taj Mahal, and the Grateful Dead. This is the soundtrack to rough and rowdy lives lived long ago in El Paso, New Orleans, Memphis, and the Oklahoma plains—with occasional diversions to Appalachia—as the spirit of these outlaws, boozers and brawlers come

tumbling into the 21st century.



Aside from the American songbook, American West plays selections from the hundreds of songs leader JW has composed over the years. From playing crawfish boils to Baton Rogue to roots festivals, American West brings music that folks can sing or dance to and feel in their souls.

Workshop – Focusing Your Songwriting on Your Performance Strengths



Julian Weisser has developed his songwriting over nearly two decades (he started at 13 years old), hundreds of songs and styles, inspired while cruising over 100,000 miles on the road. He'll show how to write songs that play to your strengths as a performer.

Workshop – How to improve your groove

Will suit all bass players, exploring the bass as a bridge between the rhythm and the tonal parts of music. Basslines and 'groove' are often put in the same sentence, but what is groove exactly? How can you improve your groove, and those other challenging bass questions?

Frans Huber is a bassist from the Netherlands who now resides in New Zealand. He has played in bands in Holland and New Zealand for over three decades and favours a groovy rhythm-based approach to bass playing.



Frans bought his bass at 16 years old when left an inheritance from his grandfather. Now 36 years later he is still playing it... **Workshop** – Drum Rhythm with Manu Francois

Rhythm is natural. Our body wants to fall in time, anticipation and fulfilment. We will aim to release you from the complications of mental effort in order to trust and create within a consistent rhythmic space.



Join percussionist and musician Manu Francois for a one hour seminar on Drum Rhythm. Beginners and experienced players welcome, after all it is in the cohesion and rhythmic conversation of players that true and enjoyable, percussive greatness is made.

Through discussion and practical play, there will be concepts and experience for everyone to take away.

Jocee Tuck

"Endearingly quirky indie singer-songwriter Jocee Tuck is not one to shy away from the unconventional, choosing to make her instrument of choice the marimba, a deep-toned xylophone perfect for



creating her whimsical signature sound.

It wasn't until studying contemporary music at university and playing with space-pop songstress Princess Chelsea that Jocee was introduced to the xylophone, quickly developing a passion for wooden and bell mallet instruments, which she incorporates into her orchestral indie-folk solo material.

After wowing the audience at the APRA Silver Scroll Awards 2016, with her heartfelt rendition of Tammy Neilson's ode to her late father, 'The First Man', Jocee moved to the country with her family and became a mother for a second time. She's now reemerged bursting with enthusiasm and living in Marlborough!

Workshop – Creating Your Own Album: Inspiration and Motivation

So, you've wanted to write that album, but not

sure how to go about it? Explore how one aspiring artist went about it and her long journey to completion. Be inspired by practical insights with creative ways of tackling the planning of a 21-instrument arranged album, including the



motivation to persevere while keeping your mental health intact, and some tips on marketing the album after the finish line.

Josie Robertson (aka Jocee Tuck) is a wife and mother of two delightful littlies who's been living in Auckland prior to a move home to Blenheim. She studied Popular Music at the University of Auckland, majoring in Songwriting. This workshop is for anyone who struggles to get large projects done, needs a boost of confidence to start, or needs some help with the battle against the mind!

Youth Artist, 15 year old Josh Keating

I love playing music and competing in country music awards all over New Zealand, I am extending my genre into folk music and will bring songs that you are sure to enjoy.

Workshop – Josh will be one of the incredible facilitators of the Youth Band project, offering his rich experience as a performing artist to help foster the folk musicians of our future.

Ren and Rob

Traditional Irish Music at its finest.

Jigs, reels, strathspeys, haunting slow airs and original compositions come to life in the



hands of these musicians.

Rob Zielinski on the fiddle and Rennie Pearson on the Wooden flute and Guitar bring all the energy and fire of this rich tradition

for a magical performance.

Rob has spent 14 years living on the west coast of Ireland and has learned directly from the old masters. In the year 2000 he won Ireland's Michael Coleman Traditional Fiddler of the Year Award.

Rennie Pearson specialises in traditional music on the wooden flute and guitar. He studied on the east coast of Canada with flute virtuoso Chris Norman. In 2016 he received a Boxwood scholarship for Rising Young Performer.

Both Rennie and Rob have performed and taught all over the world.

Workshop – Explore the music of Ireland's West Coast.

Rob Zielinski and Rennie Pearson will explore the music of Ireland where Rob lived for 14 years. They will be playing tunes from the West Coast of Ireland.

Ronél Hunter

is a singer songwriter residing in Kakapoint, Caitlins. Originally from South Africa, Ronél



played at local folk festivals before moving to New Zealand in 2009. Ronél writes songs about real life and is a firm believer in being real and being yourself. She tells stories through her songs that connect to the audience in a personal and real way. In 2017 she picked up the pen and embarked on the journey of writing songs for her Debut album, which was released in March 2020. Influences on her music include artist like Tracy Chapman, Dolly Parton, and Guy Clark.

Workshop – Songwriting tools and finding emotional truth

We will look at tools available to songwriters to take a song further than a first draft.

We will dive deeper into finding the emotional truth behind a song, what to do when you feel stuck and how to look at your song from different angles to get it to a place where it is the best version it could be, saying what you want it to say, and can connect with others.

Feel free to bring your unfinished song to share or just sit back and listen as we share examples. All levels welcome. Even if you have never written a song, but would like to give it a go.

Weaving French, Kiwi and American folk songs in with their original compositions and inspiration from their travels around the world, Sonia & Nigel will take you on an authentic, vulnerable and uplifting journey of joy, nature, humour, love, connection, nostalgia, celebration, harmony, travel and imagination.

Workshop – Sonia and Nigel: Musical Improvisation – a process of self-discovery

Open to musicians of all levels, this workshop will focus on games and strategies for building improvisational skills in personal practise and performance. Sonia & Nigel invite you on a playful exploration of musical potential, both individual and collective.

Workshop – Guitar Q&A with Nigel Gavin

Everything you always wanted to know about the quitar but were afraid to ask...

Nigel will be happy to answer your questions about both the guitar as an instrument and the techniques he incorporates in his playing.

Nigel Gavin has long been a featured player in New Zealand's eclectic music scene, with bands as diverse as the Nairobi Trio, Whirimako Black, the Fondue Set, the Jews Brothers, Lorina Harding, Wayne Gillespie, Richard Adams, the Blue Bottom Stompers, Below the Bassline, Jonathan Besser's Bravura and his own Snorkel, to name just a few.

An active and keen mentor to musicians of all ages, Nigel is the founder and director of the Gitbox Rebellion guitar ensemble. He has toured the world with Robert Fripp, of 'King Crimson' fame, and his 'League of Crafty Guitarists', giving concerts and workshops and is a founding member of the Tiny Orchestral Moments international music collaboration project in Seattle, USA.

Other Workshops

Demystifying the Native American Flute – Evan Hall

An in-depth look at the Native American flute. We will strip away the mysteries of this ancient instrument and look into the history, construction, and very essence that make up



this practical version of the simple wooden flute.

My name is Evan Blake Hall, from Texas, I am now based in sunny Nelson. Making Native American flutes and exploring the mysteries locked into its construction is my passion.

There will also be stock of my hand-crafted wooden flutes to purchase. Please bring your flutes, or other wind instruments.



Vic is an enthusiastic and experienced dancecaller from Dunedin. First called with 'Lost in the Bush' in the mid-80's, then carried on with Shiner from the 1990's. A busy band, they played Whare Flat, Wainui and Canterbury Waipara Festivals. Post-Shiner, Vic calls at Whare Flat, Waimate, Festivals and gigs around Dunedin.

Vic has some interesting dances for the workshop and aims to build a new group dance with the ideas of dancers. Strictly Come Dancing Folks!!

Old Time Jam with the Port Hillbillies




