Guest Artists

Andrew White



Andrew is a world-class instrumental guitarist and prolific singer-songwriter whose soulful voice has drawn comparison to the likes of Peter Gabriel and Sting. He is a modern-day troubadour in every sense of the word, one of those rare artists who can skilfully combine brilliant finger-style guitar work with an inspired, compelling story in lyric, weaving together elements of traditional and contemporary Celtic folk, jazz, and blues.

Coppermine Junction

Coppermine Junction are a 4 piece Bluegrass band from Nelson. Expect fast foot stompers, a blast of Americana, hot picking, soaring harmonies and lonesome waltzes. Channeling Gillian Welch, Tim O'Brien and Earl Scruggs and feauturing the great sound of banjo, mandolin, fiddle, guitar and upright bass, Coppermine



Junctions' old time mountain music raises spirits. Their music is sure to leaving you grinning and coming back for more.

Workshop - Slow Bluegrass Jam

A selection of easy and intermediate traditional bluegrass numbers aimed at allowing those less confident to take lead breaks or solos. The band will discuss useful techniques and practice tips to help players develop their skills'.

Kate Grace & Michael Parmenter

Celebrated dance choreographer Michael Parmenter and Balfolk Dunedin Director Kate Grace take inspiration from their unique venues and present paticipatory dances spanning the history of NZ – from Mid 19th century to waltz and blues.

Everyone is welcome and encouraged to attend – Michael and Kate will be



introducing choreography that's not too complex – "a basic rhythm pattern that you can do all kinds of stuff with," he says. The dances chosen can be taught in two to five minutes and are heaps of fun for all ages.

Workshop – one each morning

Balfolk Aotearoa provides an opportunity to rediscover the joy of dancing with others in a fun and supportive community environment. Balfolk is a popular dance movement based on traditional folk dances of Europe. Complex choreographies are simplified to make the dances available to as many people as possible. In contrast to the choreographed performative element associated with traditional folk-dance groups, Balfolk places the emphasis on the participatory and experiential dimension of dancing together.

Balfolk is a popular dance movement based on traditional folk dances of Europe. There is a huge repertoire of music used for these dances, many of them reasonably simple and very beautiful. This workshop is an opportunity to learn a couple of tunes from musicians who have been playing for Balfolk dances. Learners who play by ear, or who read music are all welcome.

Suits melody instruments best, but anyone welcome.



Blues Mamas

It's been a decade or more since Izzy last strutted her stuff on the Canterbury Festival stage.

For those not yet familiar with Izzy's work, she is a Scottish born contemporary folk



blues, jazz singer-songwriter known for her warm magnetic stage presence and smooth chocolate hazelnut voice – an authentic contemporary blues artist and weaver of stories who leaves no stone unturned. Izzy will be joined by awardwinning instrumentalist Susan Leigh Grant.

The long musical partnership & friendship of these two women is evident on stage. They work together seamlessly.

Susan Grant's playing is rock solid. She is an



accompanying guitarist who knows exactly how to enhance and flesh out a great song without stealing the limelight but given a solo can

turn up the heat and dazzle.


