Music contributes to our everyday lives in so many ways from go to whoa. Expectant parents play music to the new being in utero; songs and lullabies are an integral part of parenting, and we use counting songs and nursery rhymes to teach our children and help develop their language skills. Music is universal, offering a gateway to meet the challenge to unite our society, to recognise that we are all part of one world. Remembering Jacinda's words, "You are us", I look forward to that uniting connection at this festival; together let's make music reverberate. The joy on the audiences' faces at last year's concerts was evidence enough that this festival makes a difference in our lives; music makes a difference.

On behalf of the organising committee may the best of collaborative music resonate within us at this festival, and remain with each one of us.

Guest Artists

Li'l Chuck - The One Man Skiffle

Machine is an authentic one man band performing "Good time music with old time style". Chuck's mostly original songs are inspired by the sounds of Blues, Early Jazz, Western Swing, Ragtime etc. and are uniquely presented



in the style of street performers from those glory days. Sticking to the traditional one man band format, Chuck plays all the instruments simultaneously.

Captivating story telling intertwines effortlessly with heart stopping harmonica. Multiple guitar styles are underpinned by his left and right feet frantically pounding the kick and hi hat. The listener is left simply wondering, "How the hell does he do that"?

Workshop – lyrics, structure, melodies and ideas

Songwriting has been at the core of David's endless creativity ever since he 'cracked the code' in his late teens. Last month saw the release of his 3rd solo album – the trilogy showcasing his original compositions and wide ranging writing styles. He is published with NZ's leading song publisher 'Songbroker' as one of their artisan writers. David has also written campaigns and jingles for clients including the NZ Red Cross.

Yurt Party

Embrace the East European meets dubby roots sound of Yurt Party – clap hands to Balkan rhythms, sigh to haunting violin melodies, and feel the percussive beat shake the floorboards. The Christchurch-based





band have had people dancing at markets, in bars, outdoors under the sun and hitting it off at house parties!

Workshop 1 – Communication within a rhythm section

Tom and Thomas describe and demonstrate how they interact with each other to:

- \sim create strong rhythmic foundations
- ~ keep it interesting
- ~ use compatible rhythms
- ~ showcase certain players
- ~ improvise subtly without dominating melodic players

This workshop is aimed at rhythm section players, or leaders/writers who want to improve their understanding of how rhythm sections work. We'll keep it simple, practical and grooving!

Workshop 2 – How to Write Easy-to-Read music charts for (almost) everyone with Charlotte Crone

Ever struggle with quickly learning a cover song, or getting your own song ideas across in a band rehearsal?

Sometimes all you need is a simple road map so everyone is on the same page (literally!).

Bring along some notation paper if you have it, a pencil, and get ready to school up in this 1 hour workshop on how to write and easy-to-read chart that almost everyone in the band can read.

Diane Ponzio

Workshop – **v**ocal techniques – how to properly warm up your voice, & vocal performance tips

Whether you sing in the shower or on the stage, there are some wonderful do's and don'ts, and a great technique to warm up your voice before you start singing! This workshop will deliver a step by step process you can do on your own, which will give you confidence in your pitch, your range, and your performance.

In addition, you will learn valuable tips to ensure you will be at your very best every time you croon your tune in a performance setting.

The Swan Sisters

A w a r d winning singer - songwriter Amiria Grenell teams up with accomplished professional actor & musician Amy Grace.



Theirs is a delicate blend of musical styles: alt. folk with beautiful harmonies, a touch of country, a bit of dreamy pop and a dash of swingin' blues. It encapsulates their friendship and love of storytelling.

Workshop - Uke Choir

Come and join The Swan Sisters: Amy Grace and Amiria Grenell to learn a couple of wonderful uke songs as a group.

Amy and Amiria will teach chords and melody/words to two songs and then we will all perform together in the final Sunday evening concert. Suitable for beginners through to Uke maestro's.

Please bring a notebook and pen to jot notes and lyrics down.

Fables

A gentle and heartfelt indie-folk sound. Jess Bailey was taught by the Mackenzie Hills of the South Kaipara, dredged in the waters of Muriwai beach then hung out



to dry in the plum trees at home. This imagery is littered throughout the band's wistful lyrics. Jess's velveteen voice intermingled with a collection of strings, harmonies and percussion should find you quite at home.

Workshop - Songwriting

Jess Bailey of Fables will present a workshop on songwriting including tips for beginners, Q&A for all levels, and song critiques. Coming from a background of visual arts, Jess will impart techniques to write songs that paint a picture — bring lyrics of a song to workshop or start fresh.



Himmerland

Denmark, Ghana and Sweden — a truly international lineup of experienced musicians who fusion the different cultures and genres that each brings to the band, but always with respect to tradition — recent UK touring has added a further flavour to the band through the addition of Scottish singer/performer Mairi Campbell.

Workshop 1 – Improvisation with Bowed Instruments

Violin / fiddle players Mairi Campbell (Himmerland) and Lorenz Weston-Salzer (Yurt Party) will guide participants through a series of simple and fun forms for making things up in the moment. Whether sound sculpturing or tune making, there are no wrong notes! You'll get the chance to hold the drone or fly away from home... Please bring your fiddle and note paper.

Workshop 2 - Wind Instruments

Eskil Romme from Himmerland will

talk about woodwind instruments generally in folk music... keys especially, pitch, phrasing and controlling the breath which is perhaps the most important key to



make it all function... and will teach a tune or two. Bring your instruments

Workshop 3 – Steps, movements, clap, hand drumming and voice with Ayi Solomon.

Would you like to learn or practise how to drum...Then these workshops are totally made for you! It's fun, exhilarating and for all ages. This double workshop (with sessions Saturday and Sunday) is designed to teach you the basic patterns you can do with any sort of hand drum. For those who are interested to drum, learning the beats comes first! Participants to please come with one drum. There will be a limited number of drums available at the workshop to use.

Originally from Ghana now living in Copenhagen, Denmark, Solomon brings his extraordinary energy and skills to generously share with you his passion for percussion.

Workshop 4 – Bass with Emil Ringtved Nielson

Emil belongs to the new upcoming generation of very well skilled young musicians. He has played with a number of the new bands that show where Danish Folk music goes these days, bands such as Mads Hansens Kapel and Tailcoat, and he's an experienced player at Traditional Danish Dancing.

This bass workshop is suitable for all bass players including U bass. Emil starts with a focus on good technique, explores genres of music to discover the rhythms, harmony, patterns and feel, delving into the pivotal role of the bass in holding tunes together.

Adam McGrath

Travels the highways and byways of NZ, Australia, Europe and parts beyond, singing songs and offering up low rent barroom philosophy. He hopes for the best, prepares



for the worst and believes in the poetry of Smokey Robinson and the Miracles and the fury of the word on the page. He is happiest in front of a jukebox as the call for last drinks is given, because jukeboxes are getting harder to find, and the last drinks call means the lock in is ever closer.

Workshop - Tales from a Working Musician

Adam is legendary for never-quit attitude to gigging, with or without a PA, a band or even a full set of strings. He has surfed couches, bunked down in halls and stayed up all night in the spirit of the true troubadour. He has more stories than the bible, so come and listen to tales from a working musician.

Polly & the Minstrel

Otherwise known as Siobhan Sweeney and Nathan Torvik are a longstanding duo from Nelson NZ.



Siobhan's heartfelt vocals and original song writing, together with Nate's sensitive guitar accompaniment and virtuosic instrumental abilities have endeared them to audiences around the country and abroad.

Workshop – Diatonic Harmony for String Plucker's Workshop with Nate Torvik

Using basic theory and systematic thinking to expand your harmonic range within basic chord progressions, including chord construction, inversions, voice leading, etc. Much depends on the ability and ears of the participants as to how far we could go with this, but I think I can pitch it so a wide range of abilities can get something from it.

Might include a discussion on 'what is folk music?' and 'do we have authentic folk traditions in Aotearoa?'



Our volunteer team once again has put together an awesome range of kids activities to make the festival fun for all. But please make sure you know where your kids are at all times and that they know to keep quiet around the Main Hall and other events.

Other Workshops

String and Rope-making with tī kōuka/cabbage tree leaves – Diana Hinterleitner

This workshop will give you a resourceful skill that you'll be able to use in so many ways for the rest of your life!

FRIDAY



This technique for making string and rope is simple and can be used with many different materials. You will learn how to use tī kōuka / cabbage tree leaves as these are abundantly available.

Afterwards, you'll never look at tī kōuka leaves the same way again!

So things to know:

- Expect to get covered in tī kōuka
- Please bring work gloves if you have some, and bring scissors if you can
- If you have access to tī kōuka / cabbage tree leaves, do bring as big a bundle as you can! (soak for at least 24 hrs)

It will be a fun session and I can't wait to share this lovely hugely practical craft with you. Following the workshop, materials available over the weekend at Redwood Shelter for you to continue to practice.

Straight from the Soundie's Mouth Microphone Workshop with Steve Barkman

As well as being a luthier for the last 29 years, Steve has been behind the 'desk', at quite a few festivals for practically as long. This has given him



lots of time to observe stage performers with both good and bad microphone technique. Some of which he will share with you if you come along to his 'New-age, sensitive, microphone technique' workshop.

Topics covered will be:

- Sound systems basic terminology, i.e. FOH, gain, monitors, DIs
- · Why and how to make 'mic' your friend
- · Getting your message across
- · How to keep the 'soundie' happy
- Foldback what YOU should hear, and how to get it
- · How to sound your best, vocal techniques

Harmonica for beginners with Pete Royle

For musicians who are starting out or have no experience with the harmonica. Please bring a "C Major" harmonica.

The workshop will give you some basic understanding, and reference material to take home. An 'on-line' site, for students wishing to practice will be demonstrated and is highly recommended to progress from beginning level through to master player

- ~ Understanding, and refreshing musical notes in the C Major scale
- ~ Scale notes and chords, pattern of blow and suck notes
- ~ Blues and non-blues songs
- ~ Simple songs to get started playing
- ~ Keeping the instrument clean
- ~ Intro to 'Blues Harmonica'

Intermediate Fingerpicking – a general workshop with an accent on blues with Eric McFachen

For the late beginner, and intermediate guitarist, there is much to glean from Eric. His five strong decades of experience



offer those who attend the opportunity to garner a new wealth of skills that you can add to your repertoire of techniques. Eric is a humble man, funny, and wonderfully enthusiastic for the blues. He plays all hues of the blues, and will teach those who attend how to make their fingerpicking more driving and forceful.

Please bring you guitar, also pen and paper if you want to take notes

Irish Dancing Workshop with Argene Flack

All ages welcome, absolutely no experience necessary! Come along to learn the basics of Irish dancing set to the upbeat tunes from Riverdance! Argene is a qualified Irish dancing teacher with Southern Cross Irish Dance and loves teaching dancers of all ages to learn both solo and team dancing.

Recommend wearing comfortable shoes and bringing a drink bottle. See you there!



Song Writing Workshop with Gerard Manley

The workshop will approach the songwriting process as follows:

- ~ What do you want / expect from the workshop
- ~ Why do you want to write songs?
- What are your goals Personal satisfaction? Career? Get the girl/boy? Other?
- ~ Where does inspiration come from?
- ~ What skills/techniques do you have/ need?
- ~ What barriers are there for you skills, time, confidence?
- ~ Do you know what resources can help?

If participants consider these questions before the workshop we can make full use of the time. The workshop will focus on sharing what has worked for different people, how they have overcome 'writer's block' and available resources.

Festival Choir

The annual festival choir is an intrinsic part of each festival. Run by Rachel Bayliss (a professional singing teacher), the festival choir will have 3 practices over the duration of the festival, and then perform as the first act in the Sunday evening concert.

Participants of all ages and abilities are invited to come along. Be a part of an enjoyable experience. You will learn



breathing, warm-up and vocal techniques, and the only requirement from you is that you enjoy singing. The end result is always outstanding!!!

Come along, bring family and friends, and be part of this wonderful event. Lyrics will be provided. Venue is Stedfast Lounge.

You've come to the right place. Three sessions led by our team of experienced musicians to help with instrumentation, arrangements, song-writing and band development. There will be a dedicated room for the youth band for ongoing practice sessions.

The Youth band workshop is:

- ~ an encouraging place with clear goals to help accelerate your learning
- ~ a place to collaborate with your peers
- \sim a chance to perform on the main stage in the final concert
- ~ a place to get a recording of your composition/performance

Facilitators of the Youth Band are:

Willie McArthur

A music entrepreneur who believes in real music played on real instruments. 
