Guest Artists

Andrew Lockwood (UK)

UK based solo artist performing mainly acoustic originals; songs of life, love and the human condition inspired by his time in the Melbourne musical community and travels on the road. Intimate and laid back - inviting,



organic songs crafted with honest often raw lyrics upon a canvas of guitar and vocals.

Workshop Create a Festival Song Together!

Let's create a song and experience the joy of creativity from start to finish; get an insight into the processes involved. Choose the topic. Chords and rhythm choices. Melody or lyrics first? Choose some key words! Is there a hook line needed?

There are no rules to abide by when creating! Have fun with some lateral thinking.

Dave Flynn (Ireland)

Described as 'a masterful guitarist' Dave is internationally recognised for holding 'a unique place in the world of music'. His unique style draws on experience in classical, folk, jazz and popular music.

Flynn has appeared in prestigious venues including MoMa (New York), Moscow Cathedral and Ireland's National Concert



Hall. He has toured Japan, South Korea, NZ and Europe, performing at festivals like The Nuertingen International Guitar Festival, The Guitar Festival of Ireland, Dundee Guitar Festival & Moscow Christmas Festival.

Workshop I Can't Believe it's not DADGAD – Irish Guitar Workshop

Learn from a master guitarist who has performed with some of Ireland's top musicians including Martin Hayes, Liz Carroll, Mairtin O'Connor & Tommy Peoples. Dave will demonstrate his unique approach to playing Irish music. DADGAD has become the most common tuning used in Irish music, yet Dave has developed a different approach using multiple tunings to suit different settings. He will explain his approach to tunings, accompaniment, tune playing, ornamentation and why he doesn't use DADGAD!

Jessie Fenton (Auckland)

Jessie entered her first poetry slam by accident in 2015, and she's kept going



ever since just to hide her mistake. She's performed all over the country, and is a previous national slam runner-up & winner of the Auckland Writers Festival's Poetry Idol. She's also taken up mentoring, coaching high school students through the Word the Front Line spoken word competition.

Her work can be found in print in collections like *Manifesto: An Anthology of Political Poetry* and also on her blog.

Workshop Speaking Out With Spoken Word

The roots of spoken word poetry. Speak your truth onstage. Her talk will cover finding your stories, how to craft an engaging poem, performance tips, slam poetry strategy, and will close with an open mic, where you'll have a chance to get up and share your own poetry. Suitable for anyone with a story somewhere in their soul.

Lisa Tui, Jillie Toogood, Brendan O'Regan & Alastair Wallace (Christchurch)

No stranger to performing after 30 years of singing and teaching voice, Lisa Tui is now emerging as a writer and recording artist due to release her first album in 2018. Lisa merges genres from her broad background in music from African American Gospel, Pop, Jazz, Blues to Music Theatre and Country.

Her festival ensemble delivers a range of moods from epic to reflective, catchy to



transporting and gutsy. Joining Lisa Tui for the folk festival is Jillie – vocalist & local song leader, Brendan – drums, and double bass player Alastair.

Workshop Sing Out: Techniques that transform your singing and confidence.

Learn key exercises to help get you results in vocal clarity, extended range and brilliance. At this workshop you'll learn and practice Lisa's favourite technique that brings strength and precision to the voice. Bring your recording devices to practice with them at home too.

Looking for Alaska (Hamilton)

This pop-folk trio is ready to set the folk scene alight as Aaron Gott, Amy Maynard



and Stephen Daniel offer up a sound rooted in country style guitar and soaring harmonies woven at their very fibre, intensified by their on-stage chemistry.

Aaron and Amy's familiarity, closeness and authenticity is fuelled by their real life romance, creating a magnetic performance style that captivates their audience time and time again. The group has opened for the likes of Fly My Pretties, Herbs and Tiny Ruins, and as a featured act at the Auckland Folk Festival.

Workshop Youth Songwriting Workshop!

Aaron and Amy have taught music in schools

for the past four years, and have noticed that encouragement of creativity is often absent, and specifically encouragement or guidance for songwriting. This workshop aimed at kids, will cover how to start writing songs: choosing a topic, your first lyrics, composing melodies, song structures, basic chord theory and how to write a chord progression. This will be a fun and easygoing workshop suitable for kids of all ages and musical abilities. Adults are welcome too!!

Mark and Cindy Lemaire (USA)



Mark incorporates fingerpicking, slap-and-tap harmonics, hand percussion, and that hard-to-describe something that sets him in his own musical category. While Mark's guitar solo pieces stand as complete statements, his harmonies with Cindy are so perfectly matched that they seem like two people with one voice. The material runs from tongue-in-cheek songs about married life to stories of the strange surprise of middle age creeping up on us. The music ranges from subtle, pin-drop delicate solo guitar to raucous sing-alongs.

Workshop Secrets of Getting the "Open Tuning Sound" in Standard Tuning

Why are some guitar keys easier than others? How can you switch chords smoothly without leaving "holes" and nasty

noises in your song? How do you get the smooth, gliding sound of open tuning while in regular tuning?

Explore right-hand techniques that will add new colours to your palette. Use open strings to switch positions, add colour to 'normal' chords, and get those close interval "clusters" that sound so cool. Play in keys like F and B and make them sound good. It's helpful to understand note names and how chords are built (1, 3, 5, etc).

Bring your guitar, but this is NOT just for guitar fanatics! Music loving listeners are also absolutely welcome.

Neil Copeland (Dunedin)

Survivor from the Late Jurassic Period of Dunedin Folk Music, with diverse tastes in folk(ish) music, ranging from Arlo Guthrie to Flanders and Swann. Also a fan of Tom Paxton, The Corries and Fred Dagg, all of whose songs I have been known to attempt in public. And I have written the odd song and poem myself.

The emphasis is very much on humour, with occasional forays into the thoughtful and the



romantic. As well as being a folkie, I am the accordionist for Dunedin's Jack Frost Morris side.

I have also recently taken up the English concertina, which I will very probably not inflict publicly

on anyone for a while, if ever. If I have a heavy enough cold at the time, I will do a song or two in Russian.

Workshop

What makes a performance great?

Not only the lyrics and the tune, but the presentation as well. A holistic view of the whole. It incorporates some of the intangibles that make a performance memorable including: the well-crafted song, rhyme, rhythm and reason; contrast and cohesion; the Feng Shui of the set list; introduction as an art — performance not padding; humour don't go on stage without it...

The Wilding Pines (Dunedin)

The Wilding Pines features the song writing of Richard Dingwall and the instrumental virtuosity of Steve Barkman, Read Hudson and Lawrence O'Callaghan.



The sound is warm, played mostly on acoustic instruments with flashing instrumental embellishment from Read on Dobro, mandolin and even banjo; from Steve on guitar and mandolin and Lawrence on dobro and guitar. The songs spring from the life and history of Southern New Zealand.

Workshop Songwriters Panel

Chaired by Richard Dingwall from the Wilding Pines, a group of songwriters including Anu Grace, Lisa Tui Jonathon, Mark Lemaire and Aaron Gott and Amy Maynard from Looking for Alaska perform examples of their work and discuss their craft.

Tweed (Auckland)

Hailing from Auckland, this alternative folk trio has a distinctive style of catchy melodies, poly-rhythms, and tight-knit, complex

vocal harmonies. Their vintage sound is reminiscent of CSN and Joni Mitchell.

Tweed's debut album - High-Brow Blues,



is a lively, earnest reflection on the peculiar shared experience of circling a star.

Workshop Vocal Harmony: Beyond Basics

An interactive workshop exploring how to add life and body to a piece of music:

Arrangement (placement of harmony within the piece), Layering (building and developing harmony), Dissonance (add interest & complexity), Delivery (diction and dynamics to realise the potential of good harmony).

Uke Nomad (Australia)

Anu Grace is an accredited James Hill



Ukulele teacher and has worked as both a professional musician for 27 years and a community music teacher for over 12 years.

Laurie and Anu are touring from Australia where they have been running Ukestra's in regional and Outback locations, spreading the joy of uke and community music making.

LUX NOMAD play original and contemporary Jazz/Folk/Soul featuring a Barron River Tenor and Bass Ukuleles.

Tripping tenor uke loops, allows the flute to solo and gorgeous vocal Lead and harmonies to soar. Original lyrics shine through with a swag of favourite covers and there's plenty of chances to sing along.

Workshop The Pop-Up UKESTRA

A Uke experience enabling all levels of players to participate with ease. Includes a selected lead singer for each song, soloist and a Uke-bass player. Timing and rhythm are key to songs sounding good and each song will start with learning the basic count and embedding the chord sequence under our fingers.

The Pop-Up Ukestra will have you notching up your skill/theory/memory level as well as having fun and singing. An immersive uke experience that ends in a public performance without sheet music — suitable for all who have at least C, F G7 under their fingers!

Other Workshops

String and Rope-making with tī kōuka/cabbage tree leaves – Diana Hinterleitner

This workshop will give you a resourceful skill that you'll be able to use in so many ways for the rest of your life!



This technique for making string and rope is simple and can be used with many different materials. You will learn how to use tī kōuka / cabbage tree leaves as these are abundantly available. Afterwards, you'll never look at tī kōuka leaves the same way again!

So things to know:

- Expect to get covered in tī kōuka
- Please bring work gloves if you have some, and bring scissors if you can
- If you have access to tī kōuka / cabbage tree leaves, do bring as big a bundle as you can! (soak for at least 24 hrs)

It will be a really fun session and I can't wait to share this lovely hugely practical craft with you. Following the workshop, materials available over the weekend at Tui Shelter for you to continue to practice your new skills.

The Logic of the Fretboard with Eileen Reid Demystifying the Fretboard: Don't Be Daunted by that Scary Long Neck!

This guitar theory workshop offers tips for exploring beyond the first few frets and gaining an elementary understanding of the logic of it all.

I started exploring and became fascinated with the formulaic way the fretboard works and how a little understanding goes a long

way towards being able to improvise and contribute something in almost any jam situation. I'm offering you the shortcut, a direction towards the Great Leap Forward!



The workshop will cover

- Name the Notes: Simple tips to help you to get to know the notes up the neck
- Root out the Root: identifying the root
- The Key to the Key: What key is it in? What chords can I use?
- Nail a Scale: The logic & value of scales
- · Build a Chord: It's all in the formula

Straight from the Soundie's Mouth Microphone Workshop led by Steve Barkman

As well as being a luthier for the last 29 years, Steve has been behind the 'desk', at quite a few festivals for practically as long. This has given him lots of time to observe

stage performers with both good and bad microphone technique. Some of which he will share with you if you come along to his 'New-age, sensitive,



microphone technique' workshop.

Topics covered will be:

- Sound systems basic terminology, i.e. FOH, gain, monitors, DIs
- · Why and how to make 'mic' your friend
- · Getting your message across
- · How to keep the 'soundie' happy
- Foldback what YOU should hear, and how to get it
- How to sound your best, vocal techniques

InterPlay Workshop with Belinda Meares

InterPlay is an improvisation practice that combines voice and movement, song and story in easy, incremental ways.



Besides being great fun, develops expressive versatility, creative confidence and connection with others. It takes the focus off performance, yet often leads to moments of delightful, unforced artistry. Great for singers and songwriters!

You'll access the power of your voice and source song ideas. Belinda trained in InterPlay in Australia and is also an experienced Alexander Technique teacher. She lives in Greta Valley and teaches InterPlay in Christchurch.

Festival Choir



The annual festival choir is an intrinsic part of each festival. Run by Rachel Bayliss (a professional singing teacher), the festival choir will have 3 practices over the duration of the festival, and then perform as the first act in the Sunday evening concert.

Participants of all ages and abilities are invited to come along. Be a part of an enjoyable experience. You will learn

breathing, warm-up and vocal techniques, and the only requirement from you is that you enjoy singing. The end result is always outstanding!!!


Where the Wild Things Are Musical Parade
