Guest Artists

All Day Breakfast Stringband (Canada)

Montreal-based All Day Breakfast Stringband plays old time music from the southern and midwestern USA. Fiddle, guitar, double bass, banjo, and voices join forces to confirm that the old music is still exhilarating.

Workshops

Dara Weiss from All Day Breakfast Stringband and Flora

Knight combine their skills to bring you *Old Time Singing* – choosing the songs to suit your voice, some tips on finding the right songs and keys will be discussed. The group will learn and sing two old time songs inspired by Dara and Flora who will be offering support: two tutors, two parts: a fantastic opportunity to discover how harmony works together.

Beginner Old Time Mandolin with Andrew Kobus

Participants will be examining the roll of the mandolin in the old time music genre. Students will be introduced to accompanying techniques, new positions on the fretboard and learn a couple old time mandolin tunes.



Beginner Old Time Fiddle with Max Evans



You will be introduced to the old time fiddling style. The role of the fiddle in old time music will be discussed and one or two old time fiddle tunes from the Appalachian region of the United States will be taught. Students should have basic skills on the violin for this workshop.

Charlotte Yates and Show Pony (Wellington)

Charlotte has recorded six albums, studied music technology and composition in Australia, produced two Melbourne Fringe Arts Festivals, been artist in residence in Christchurch (2002) and was a finalist for the APRA Silver Scroll Award with her iconic song 'Red Letter', and recently studied songwriting at Berklee College of Music, USA.



Show Pony (Emily Clemett) based in Wellington, has worked both in UK and NZ. Growing up with music, it remains a passion. Sharing her enthusiasm and joy of music and meeting countless incredible and diverse musicians around the globe is a constant inspiration.

Workshop

Why do my songs sound cheesy? with Charlotte Yates

Learn how to make your songs connect deeply with your audience, sound professional, original and authentic. In this one hour session, songwriter and songwriting coach Charlotte Yates can show you how to take the cheese and clichés out of your songs and improve the impact they can have on your listeners. Less cringe, less whinge – the answer is all in the details!

Eric McEachen (Canterbury)

Blues with personality, or rather, blues with irrepressible personality. That's Eric McEachen, stalwart of the NZ folk music scene since the late 1960s and still going strong in his 7th decade.

Apprenticeship completed at Wellington's famed Monde Marie Coffee House, Eric became a pillar of folk festivals and their after hours' sing-alongs up and down the land – and still is within the South Island.



Workshop

Intermediate Fingerpicking: a general workshop with an accent on blues

For the late beginner, and intermediate guitarist, there is much to glean from Eric. His five strong decades of experience offer those who attend the opportunity to garner a new wealth of skills that you can add to your repertoire of techniques. Eric is a humble man, funny, and wonderfully enthusiastic for the blues. He plays all hues of the blues, and will teach those who attend how to make their finger-picking more driving and forceful.

Flora Knight and Sean Donald (Dunedin and Canada)



Soon after their first high five, Sean Donald (CAN) and Flora Knight (CAN/NZ) slipped into a kindred musical bond and began singing close country harmonies and digging out dusty old fiddle tunes.

Whether it's a rip roaring ragtime fiddle tune, a mournful country classic, or a sweet and silly waltz played in an old dance hall, in a living room, on a street corner or by a bonfire, Sean and Flora will

play til their fingers bleed for whoever'll take a minute to stop and listen.

Workshops

Flora Knight refer to Old Time Singing (All Day Breakfast Stringband) Beginner Clawhammer Banio with Sean Donald

Sean will be talking about the origins of the banjo and how it has evolved into what we know today. Students can expect to learn how to be more comfortable with their instruments and to learn some basic techniques to help develop their playing and find their own sound. Sean will also talk about regional styles, notable banjo players, tunings, basic banjo care and how to further own their self-learning.



Jenny Mitchell (Gore)

Southern songwriter Jenny Mitchell is one of New Zealand's brightest musical talents. Hailing from Gore, she is a songwriter that blends country, folk, and Americana into her own captivating style.

Workshop

The Life of a Young, Independent Musician with Jenny Mitchell

This workshop will be a personal journey about the life of a young musician,

and the impact that choices can make. It will include a background on me, the choices of university versus pursuing music full time, what life is like for me now while studying and performing. There will also be some looking into the future and my plan once I graduate. Your chance to hear what it is like for a contemporary musician who has a wealth of experience that belies her age, and some insights into the current music industry of New Zealand.

Lloyd & Doublet (Christchurch)

John and Phil both enjoy diverse and acclaimed musical careers. They met and began performing and writing as a duo in late 2009 before being introduced to a wider music audience at the 2010 Jazz and Blues Festival.

They released a live album recorded 2011 in concert – *Live Ones* from The Mussel Inn.

Workshop

The Accidental Songwriter with John Sanchez-Lloyd and Phil Doublet

This will be a workshop for lateralthinking, fun-loving, musical daredevils!

Serendipity will be a major factor in this exercise as participants will work both as individuals and then as part of two groups to fashion a song from the bottom up.



An instrument could be handy as a working tool. Things are likely to get ramped up in this nail-biting excursion into a world of musical happenstance. Limited to first 12 intrepid folk.

Molly's Remedy (Christchurch)

Christchurch-based *Molly's Remedy* are vibrant and soulful. They mix folk, country and Irish traditional music performing original songs and re-arrangements in an energetic yet sensitive way. Helen, Monica and Mary together create something



really special. Three strong personalities singing from the heart in a perfect blend of harmony, honesty and humour.

Workshop

Music and Movement with the Mollies – Molly's Remedy are delighted to be presenting a Music Workshop for children aged 0 – 12yrs that focuses on the six elements of music – Beat, Rhythm, Pitch, Tempo, Volume and Timbre. This will include: Action songs, Movement and Dance, Finger Play, Body Percussion, Untuned Percussion and Chanting.

Everyone is invited to participate in all activities regardless of age, music is enjoyable for all. The enthusiastic leaders will interact personally with both parents and children, encouraging you with ideas that you can continue at home and provide your children with a rich sensory environment. If you have an untuned or home-made percussion instrument, please bring that along. It will be high energy and lots of fun.

Anna Heinz and Carol Rose have been jamming and performing together for 20 years, but mostly as two of the five members of the Nelson group *Cairde*. For many years they have talked about putting together a duo act and here they are, they've done it!

Workshop

Guitar Workshop – Working on Arrangements with Two Guitars with RoseAnna

This workshop will cover



- Finding the chords in other places on the guitar neck, including using the capo.
- Mixing strum and picking or two approaches to picking
- Restraining the strum to making it blend
- Putting stuff together to suit a song.

It would be suitable for anyone though for playing along, people would need to be able to play chords and it would be useful to bring a capo.

Other Workshops

Interplay with Belinda Meares

InterPlay is an improvisation practice that combines movement, voice, story and song in easy, incremental ways. Besides being great fun, its practice helps develop expressive versatility, creative confidence and supportive connection with others. It takes the focus off performance, yet often leads to moments of delightful, unforced artistry. This playshop is open to teens and adults. If you have mobility issues, there will be choices.



A North Canterbury local, Belinda trained in InterPlay in Australia. She is an experienced Alexander Technique teacher and loves to dance, sing and do improvised theatre.

The Logic/Demystifying the Fretboard

Don't Be Daunted by that Scary Long Neck! with Eileen Reid

Name the Notes: Simple tips to help you to get to know the notes up the neck

Root out the Root: identifying the root note

The Key to the Key: What key is it in? What chords can I use?

Nail a Scale: The logic and value of scales Build a Chord: It's all in the formula

This guitar theory workshop offers some tips to anyone seeking a direction for exploring beyond the scope of the first few frets and gaining an elementary understanding of the logic of it all. You can do so much on those first few frets that it's



easy to allow complacency to set in. Once I started exploring, I became fascinated with the formulaic way the fretboard works and how a little understanding goes a long way towards being able to improvise and contribute something in almost any jam situation. It was a long journey of discovery and now I'm offering you the shortcut, a direction towards the Great Leap Forward! All in easy steps, I just don't know enough to make it complicated!

Try out the harp with Helen Webby

This is your chance to get close and intimate with that ancient instrument, the harp. Helen has 10 small harps that people can use for this workshop, and if you have your own harp, bring it along for the fun! You'll learn some basic finger skills and a couple of easy harp tunes, that will give you the tools to create your own magic with the harp. Helen Webby ran an extremely popular and long running Beginner Harp class through University of Canterbury Continuing Education Program, and this workshop is a revival of that course.



Sound Mixing for Beginners with Steve Stern

This workshop is for anyone wanting to gain insight into the world of sound mixing. Aimed at beginners the workshop will cover the big five sound mixing techniques:

Blending levels, Using EQ, Controlling Dynamics, Using Effects, Mixing Monitors

The workshop will guide attendees through some practical examples of the techniques and demonstrate that the world of sound mixing is not so scary. Whilst the workshop will focus on using PreSonus Univeral Control Surface software (Used at the Christchurch Folk Music Club) all the techniques are universal to sound mixing.



Festival Choir

The annual festival choir is an intrinsic part of each festival. Run by Rachel Bayliss (a professional singing teacher), the festival choir will have 3 practices over the duration of the festival, and then perform as the first act in the Sunday evening concert.



Participants of all ages and abilities are invited to come along. Be a part of an enjoyable experience. You will learn breathing, warm-up and vocal techniques, and the only requirement from you is that you enjoy singing. The end result is always outstanding!!! Come along, bring family and friends, and be part of this wonderful event.


